BALTIMORE COUNTY COUNCIL MINUTES LEGISLATIVE SESSION 2010, LEGISLATIVE DAY NO. 14 September 7, 2010 7:00 P.M.

A. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Olszewski at 7:00 P.M. The Chairman asked the audience to rise for a moment of silent meditation and the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag led by Boy Scout Troop 818, Phoenix, Maryland. B. <u>APPROVAL OF JOURNAL</u>

Upon motion by Councilman Moxley, seconded by Councilman McIntire, the reading of the Journal Entries for the meeting of August 2, 2010 was waived and accepted unanimously.

C. <u>ENROLLMENT OF BILLS</u>

The Chairman stated that the following bills were passed by the County Council and signed by the County Executive. He certified and delivered to the Secretary, Bills 51-10, 52-10, 53-10, 54-10, 55-10, 56-10, 57-10, 59-10, 63-10. The County Executive also returned Bill 61-10 unsigned. Bill 61-10 stands enacted as of September 7, 2010.

D. INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

BILL 71-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of amending the 2010-2011 Current Expense Budget, by appropriating to the Gifts and Grants Special Revenue Fund monies derived from federal funds and made available to the County through the Maryland Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation. The Maryland Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation has made an award of federal funds available to the Baltimore County Office of Workforce Development, to be used for employment and training activities. **BILL 72-10**, entitled An Act for the purpose of amending the 2010-2011 Current Expense Budget, by appropriating to the Gifts and Grants Special Revenue Fund monies derived from state funds and made available to the County through the Governor's Office for Children. The Governor's Office for Children has made an award of state funds available to the Baltimore County Local Management Board, to be used for the provision of wraparound family support services to divert children from a Voluntary Placement Agreement.

BILL 73-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of amending the 2010-2011 Current Expense Budget, by appropriating to the Gifts and Grants Special Revenue Fund monies derived from federal funds and made available to the County through the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention. The Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention has made an award of federal funds available to the Baltimore County Police Department, to be used to fund the salary and fringe benefits for two part- time Human Services Associate positions.

BILL 74-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of amending the 2010-2011 Current Expense Budget, by appropriating to the Gifts and Grants Special Revenue Fund monies derived from private funds and made available to the County through the First Financial Credit Union. The First Financial Credit Union has made an award of private funds available to the Baltimore County Health Department, to be used for the School-Based Dental Sealant Program.

BILL 75-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of revising certain setback and building height standards and requirements for certain types of traditional housing units; and generally relating to uses in the County's business zones.

BILL 76-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of amending the 2010-2011 Current Expense Budget, by appropriating to the Gifts and Grants Special Revenue Fund monies derived from state funds and made available to the County through the Maryland Tourism Development Board/Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development. The Maryland Tourism Development Board/Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development has made an award of state funds available to the Baltimore County Department of Economic Development, to be used for marketing business and leisure travel in the County.

BILL 77-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of prohibiting the distribution, use, purchase or possession of certain synthetic products or compounds known as Spice or K2; defining terms; providing exceptions; providing penalties; and generally relating to the regulation of certain synthetic compounds.

<u>BILL 78-10</u>, entitled An Act for the purpose of providing an exception to bulk regulations for certain approved condominium regimes.

BILL 79-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of conforming county law with state law pursuant to the enactment of Chapter 199 of the Laws of Maryland of 2010; repealing the statutory requirement to hold certain junk or scrap metal for a certain number of days; altering the type of information a junk dealer or scrap metal processor must record and report after the purchase of junk or scrap metal; repealing law on the release of junk or scrap metal; altering the authority of the Police Department to inspect the records of a junk dealer or scrap metal processor; clarifying the application of certain enforcement provisions; altering the penalty for certain violations; defining certain terms; and generally relating to conforming county law with state law.

<u>BILL 80-10</u>, entitled An Act for the purpose of permitting certain large retail businesses by Special Exception in certain of the County's business zones; and generally relating to uses in certain business zones.

BILL 81-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of permitting certain uses in an M.R. Zone subject to certain approval guidelines; and generally relating to uses in M.R. Zones.

BILL 82-10, entitled An Act for the purpose of authorizing a property tax credit for owners of residential real property that utilizes certain energy devices; defining terms; providing for the amount and duration of the credit; providing for eligible costs; limiting the annual amount of credits; providing for an application procedure; and generally relating to tax credits for energy conservation devices.

<u>BILL 83-10</u>, entitled An Act for the purpose of permitting an anemometer to be located on properties in certain zones; defining terms; specifying certain limitations; providing for a permit; and generally relating to the use of anemometers.

<u>BILL 84-10</u>, entitled An Act for the purpose of prohibiting the selling of goods or services by licensed persons to the occupants of certain residential properties and at certain times; and generally relating to door-to-door soliciting.
